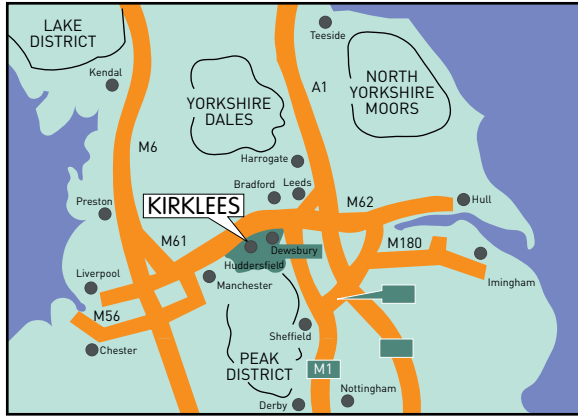




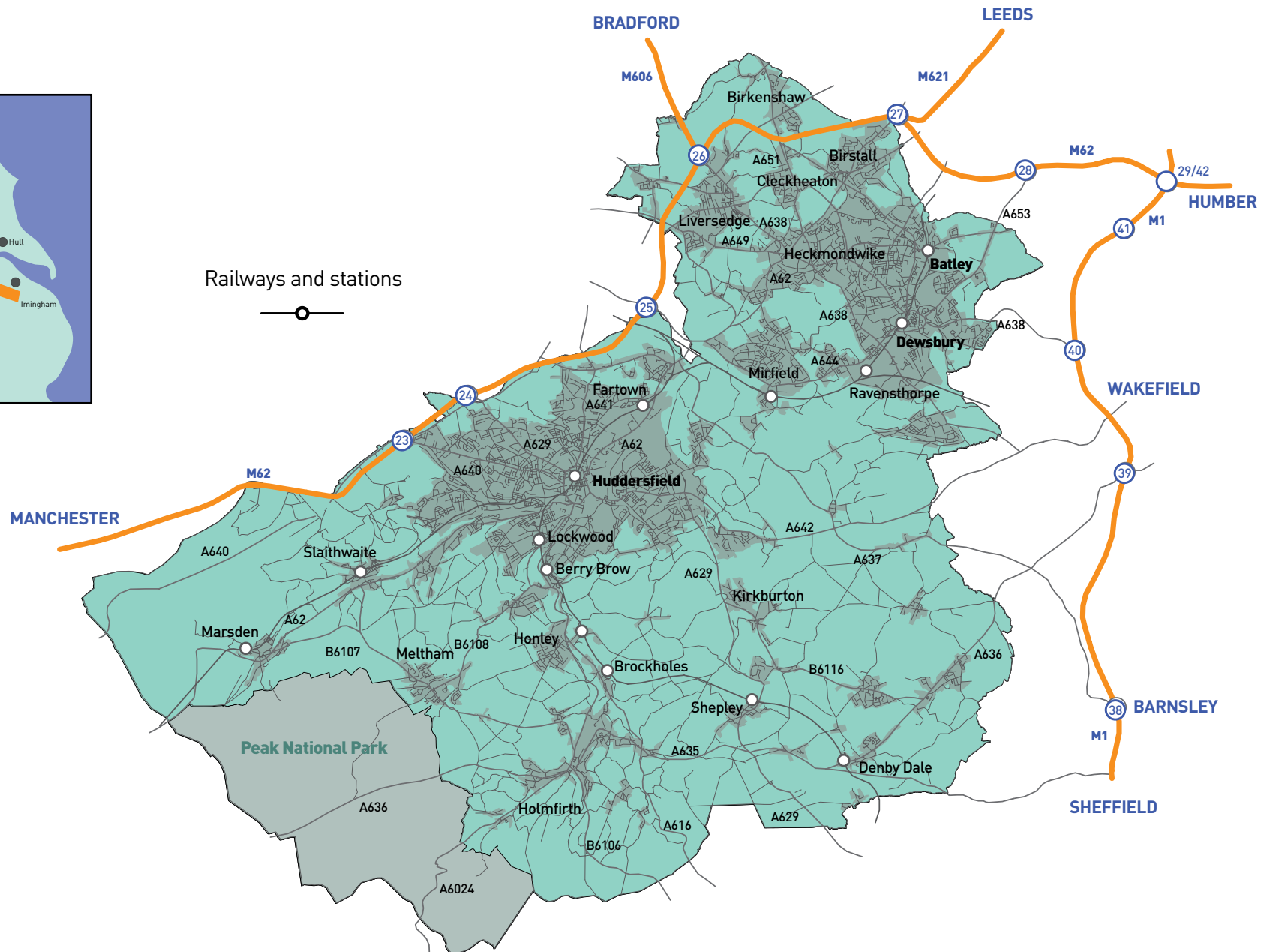
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The Kirklees District

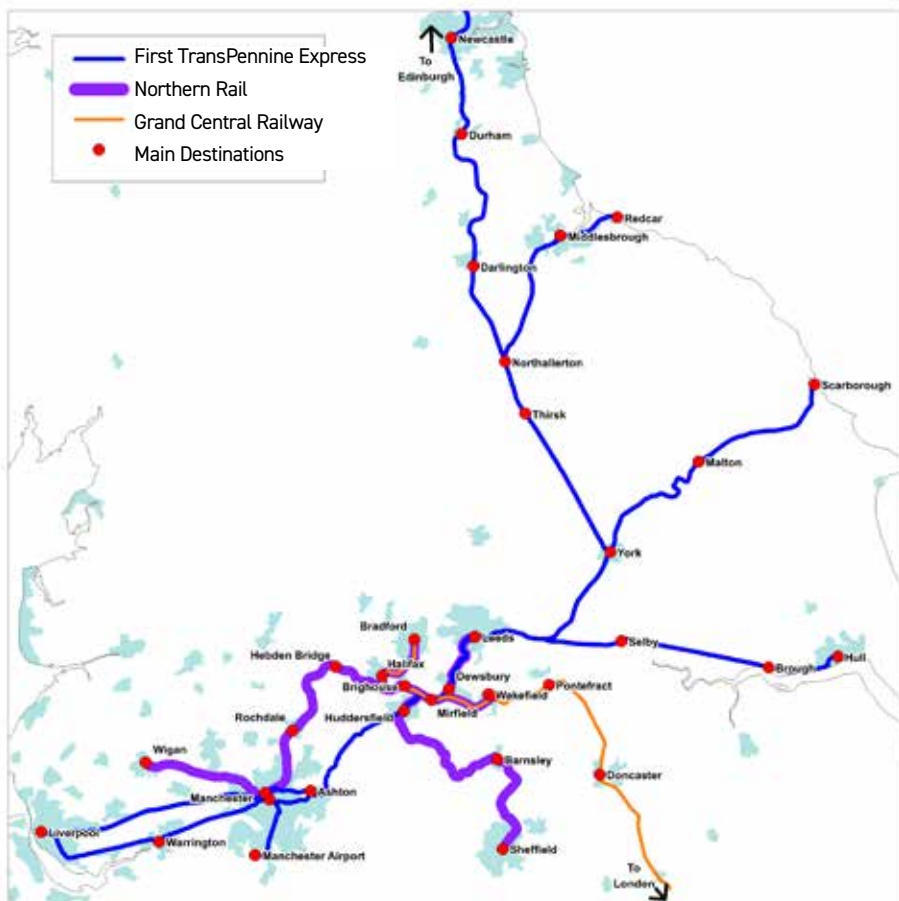


The large map shows Kirklees in detail, while the inset shows the district in context



Rail Services

Train services in Kirklees are provided by three companies: First TransPennine Express, Grand Central Railway, and Northern Rail. The map below shows the extensive network of services operating from Kirklees, and the main destinations which can be reached directly from Kirklees stations. A new station was opened in May 2017 at Low Moor which is less than 3 miles from Cleckheaton and less than 2 miles from Scholes.



Bus services

Most bus services in Kirklees are provided by companies which are subsidiaries of bus giants Arriva and First Bus, though other smaller companies do operate within the area.

Total Monday -Saturday daytime route length in Kirklees is 361 miles with a daytime mean frequency of 2.8 buses each way per hour per route mile. Monday -Saturday evenings route length is 235 miles, with a mean frequency of 1.5 buses per hour each way.

Fares (December 2020)

Practically all bus and train companies operating in Kirklees and West Yorkshire accept Metrocard season tickets and Metro day rovers. Metrocards and Metro day rovers are administered by West Yorkshire Passenger Transport Executive and are available from post offices, railway stations and Metro travel centres. A number of types of Metrocard are available ranging from bus only (cheapest), to bus and all 5 rail zones (most expensive).

Day Rovers are available which allow unlimited travel all day Saturday/Sunday/Bank Holidays. However, there are restrictions Monday - Fridays as most tickets do not allow travel before 09:30 and are not valid for rail travel between 16:00 and 18:30.

Family day rover: £13.40 (valid on buses and trains, up to 2 adults and 3 children/concessions can travel on one ticket. May also be used by 2 adults travelling without children/concessionary passengers).

Train and bus day rover: one adult £8.70

Train day rover: adult £8.30, concessions/children £4.15.

Metro day bus rover: adult £6.70, (Valid anytime, any day), children and young people £2.75. Metro Weekender (bus only) £8.50

Some bus companies run their own pre-paid season ticket schemes, e.g. First, Arriva and Yorkshire Tiger, which offer substantial discounts for regular travellers. Companies also offer local area day tickets which vary in price according to the time of day travelled. Holmfirth and Meltham passengers can buy through rail and bus combined tickets on Connection bus services.

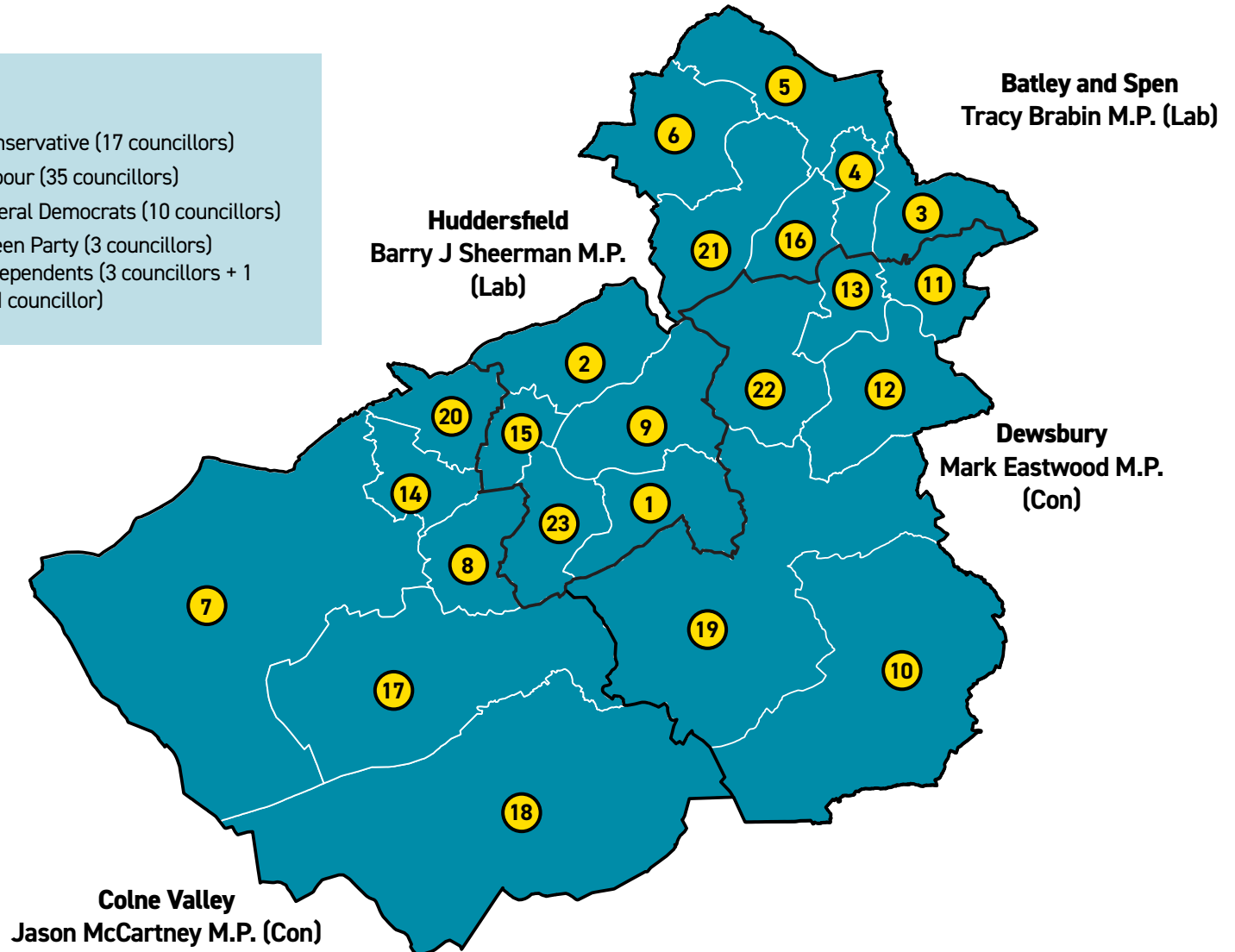

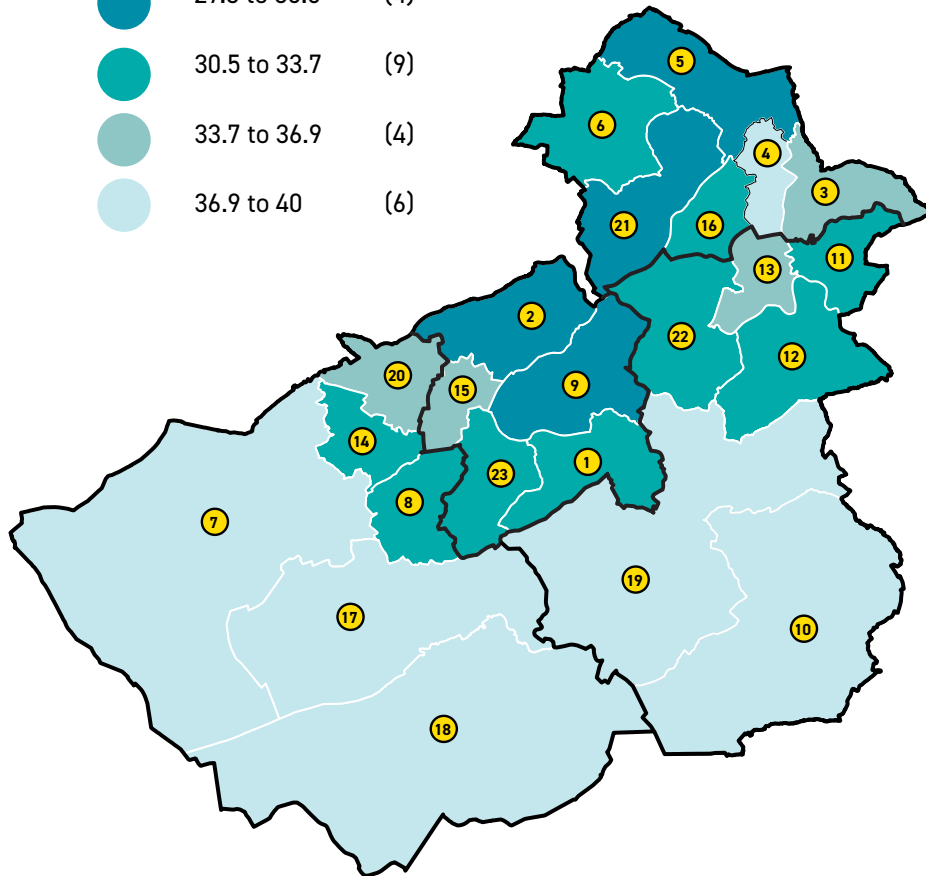
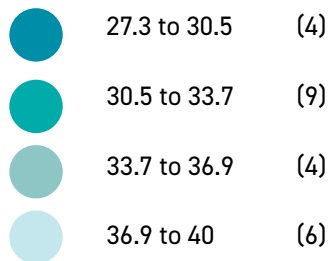

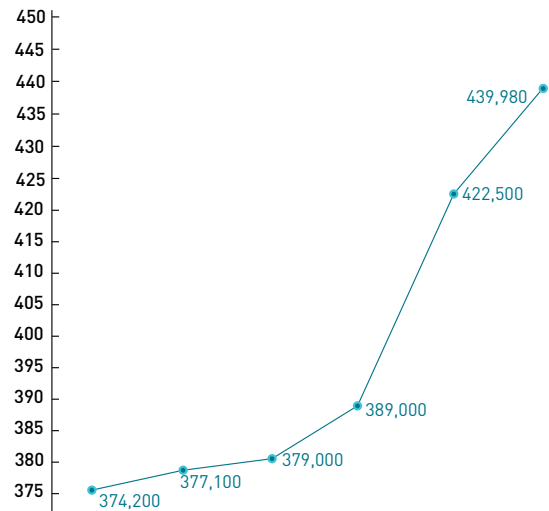

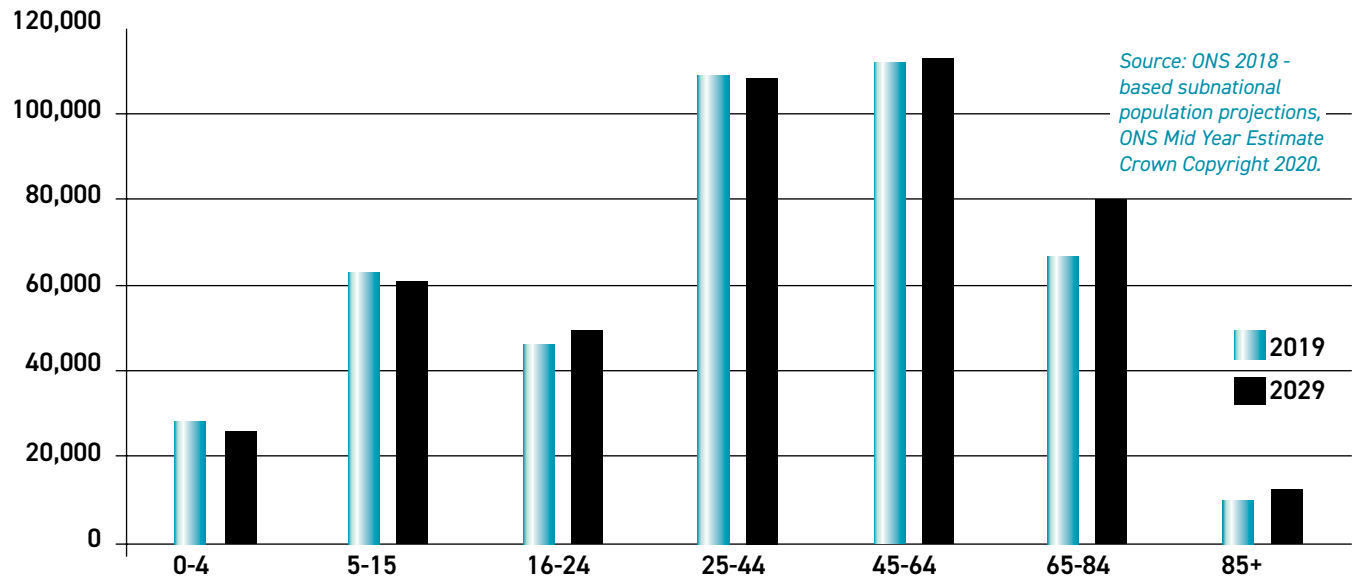

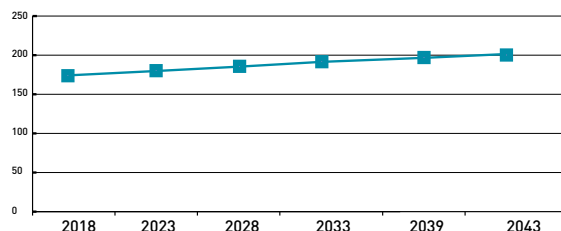

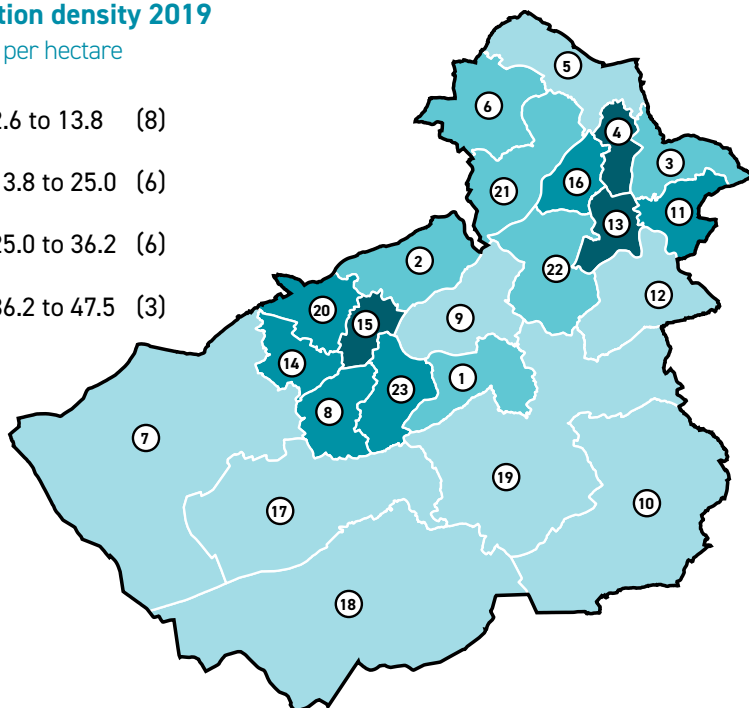

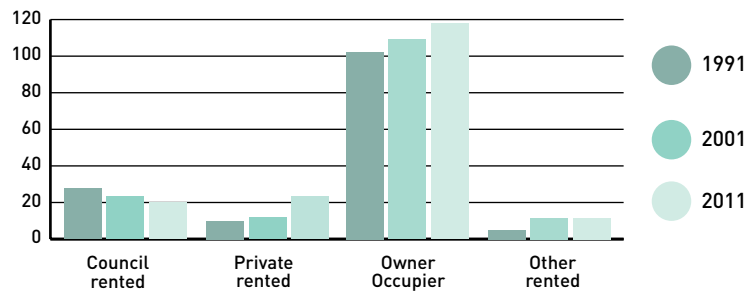

Transpennine Route Upgrade

The Transpennine Route Upgrade aims to deliver faster, longer, more frequent and more reliable services across the north of England, from Newcastle, Hull and York towards Manchester and Liverpool via Leeds. Network Rail has worked on the development of potential infrastructure options for the Transpennine Route Upgrade and has now submitted these options to the Department for Transport for consideration.

Locally more immediate improvements to the railway between Huddersfield and Dewsbury were announced in August 2019. The current layout restricts the number and speed of trains which can be run, as well as currently being a source of delays. A period of consultation took place in September 2019 to be followed by a formal Transport and Works Act Order application in autumn 2020. Once the Act has been approved by Parliament the work which will take around five years to complete can begin.

Proposed infrastructure improvements

- Doubling the number of tracks from two to four along the majority of the railway.
- Separating sections of track from each other by either a bridge (fly-over) or tunnel (dive-under) at Ravensthorpe.
- Upgrading stations at Huddersfield, Deighton, Mirfield and Ravensthorpe.
- Electrification of the railway from Huddersfield to Ravensthorpe – and right through to Leeds.

Benefits

- A more resilient and reliable railway, improved journey times and increased frequency of trains.
- Station upgrades to modern standards with better facilities for passengers will take place at Huddersfield, Deighton, Mirfield and Ravensthorpe.
- Electrification will mean cleaner travel and quieter trains with less noise for those living near the railway. Our proposals include improvements at Huddersfield, Deighton, Mirfield and Ravensthorpe for passengers.
- More seats and more trains better connects the cities in the North which supports economic growth.

The Kirklees Local Plan was adopted on 27 February 2019. The Local Plan is now the statutory development plan for Kirklees and has superseded the Kirklees Unitary Development Plan. The HD one

KSDL and CDP have created a joint venture company 'The HD One Kirklees Limited' which will build the scheme. August 2019 saw the announcement that a major international group has lodged a planning application to build a 4-star 148 bedroom hotel close to the stadium. The hotel is expected to be completed in 2021.

A devolution deal for West Yorkshire

Leaders of the five West Yorkshire councils have secured an ambitious devolution deal with Government, which will see an historic transfer of powers and investment from Whitehall to our region. It will give local control of at least £1.8 billion of funding to be spent on the things that matter to the people of West Yorkshire.

The deal means decisions across key areas, such as better transport, skills, the economy, housing and regeneration will be taken in West Yorkshire by people who know and understand the region, bringing benefits for rural and urban communities and improvements to people's quality of life.

It will also mean a directly-elected mayor for West Yorkshire with elections being held in May 2021.

The deal includes:

- £38 million per year for 30 years into the West Yorkshire Investment Fund with significant freedoms to spend on local priorities
- a Government commitment to work with West Yorkshire to develop a modern mass transit system through access to a new five-year integrated transport settlement – a share of a £4.2 billion fund for mayoral combined authorities

- £317 million to invest in public transport, cycling and walking through the Transforming Cities Fund with local flexibility on delivery
- a £25 million fund to support the development of a British Library North in Leeds
- a Government commitment to deliver flooding schemes worth £101 million
- control of the £63 million annual Adult Education Budget for West Yorkshire
- £3.2 million to support the development of a pipeline of housing sites across West Yorkshire
- £200,000 Government funding for collaboration at a Yorkshire-level through the Yorkshire Leaders Board

A period of consultation took place between 25 May and 19 July 2020 with 4,413 people responding. If the agreement is ratified then a West Yorkshire Mayor could be elected in May 2021.

The plan aims to deliver five key objectives for Huddersfield Town Centre: A vibrant culture, art, leisure and nightlife offer, thriving businesses, a great place to live, improved access and enhanced public spaces.

It focuses on regenerating six key areas: Station Gateway, St Peter's, Kingsgate and King Street, New Street, the Civic Quarter and a new Cultural Heart in the Queensgate and Piazza area.

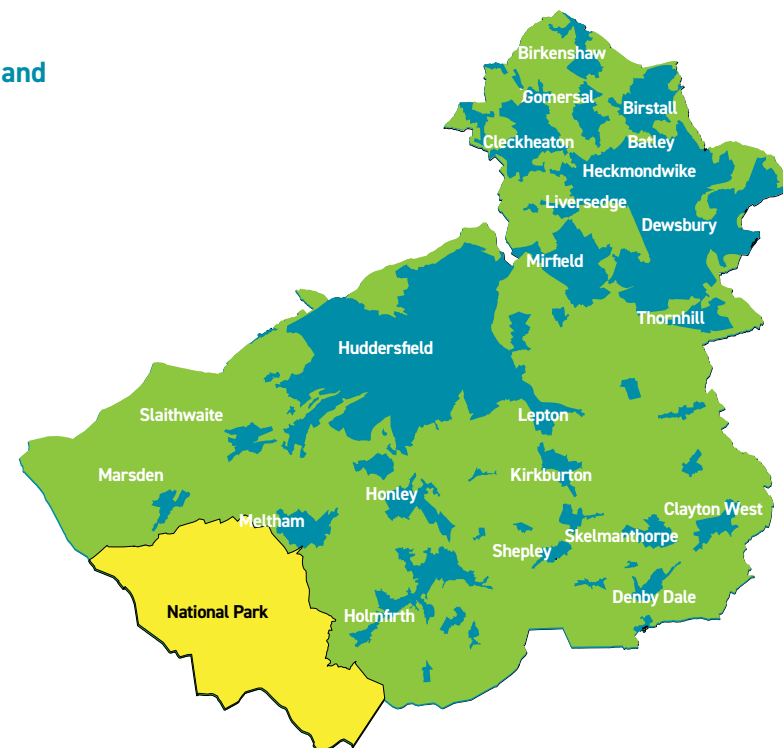

The local economy

Gross Value Added 2018 (balanced approach)

Gross Value Added (GVA) is a measure of the increase in the value of the economy due to the production of goods and services. For the balanced measure, GVA(B), it is measured at current basic prices (value in £ million), which include the effect of inflation. At larger geographical areas (greater than local authority), GVA(B) is provided in "real" terms in chained volume measures (CVM), with the effect of inflation removed.

Historically ONS has produced estimates of regional gross value added (GVA) using the income approach (as National Statistics) and the production approach (as Experimental Statistics). However, for the first time ONS have taken the strengths from both approaches and used them to produce a new balanced measure of regional GVA, GVA(B). This gives users a single measure of economic activity within a region, therefore avoiding any confusion from having two different estimates of the same thing.

In 2018 the GVA (B) for Kirklees was £7.5bn which represents less than 1% of the UK of £1.909tn. Kirklees GVA per head is £17,084 (UK £28,729). Nationally, Westminster has the highest GVA per head (£267,958) with East Renfrewshire the lowest at £11,022. In 1998 manufacturing accounted for 27.9% of GVA in Kirklees (UK 16.2%), by 2018 this had decreased to 24.4% (UK 9.9%) though still remains a very important part of the local economy.

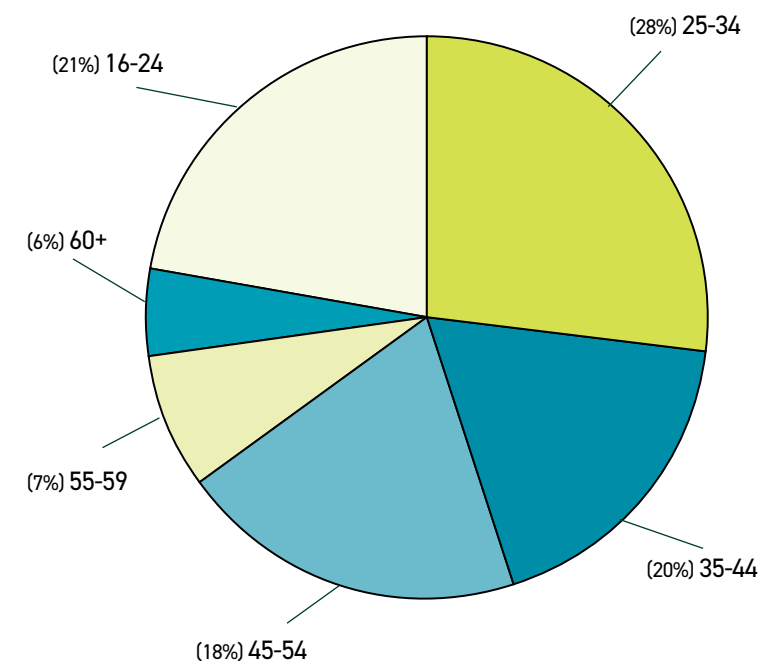

Age structure of the unemployed June 2020



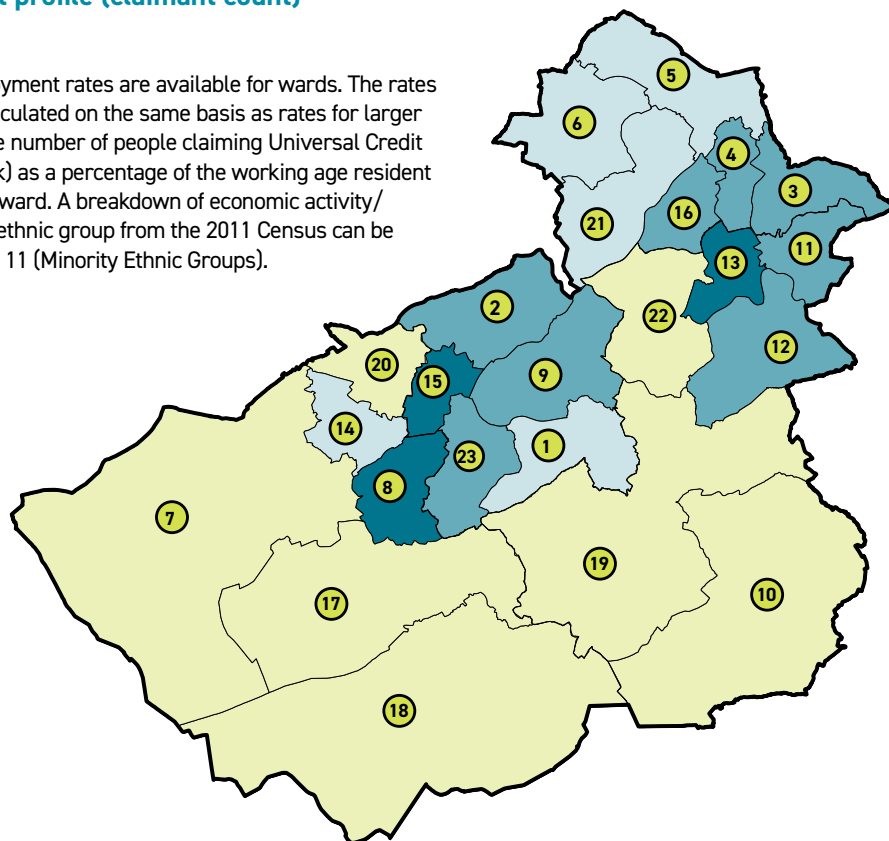

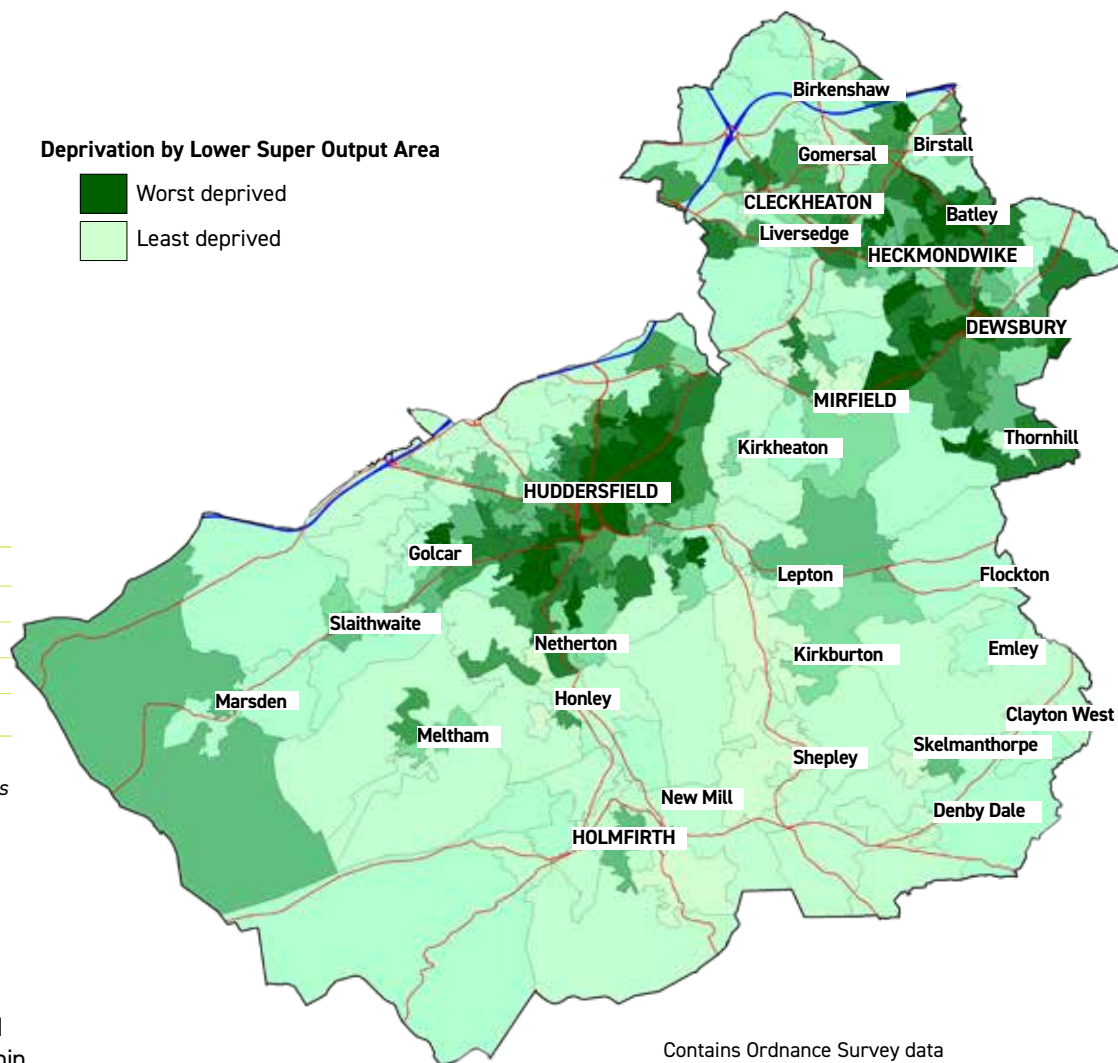

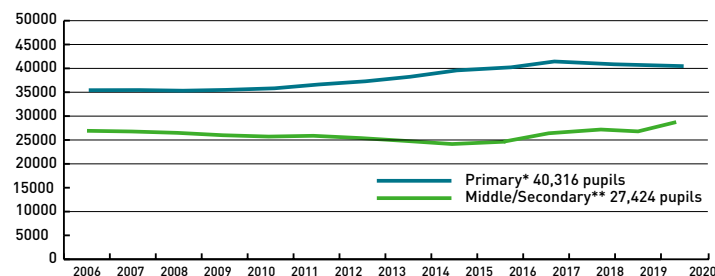

Joint Strategic Needs Assessment

Local authorities and clinical commissioning groups (CCGs) have to develop Joint Strategic Needs Assessments (JSNAs) and Joint Health and Wellbeing Strategies (JHWSs), on behalf of the Health and Wellbeing Board.

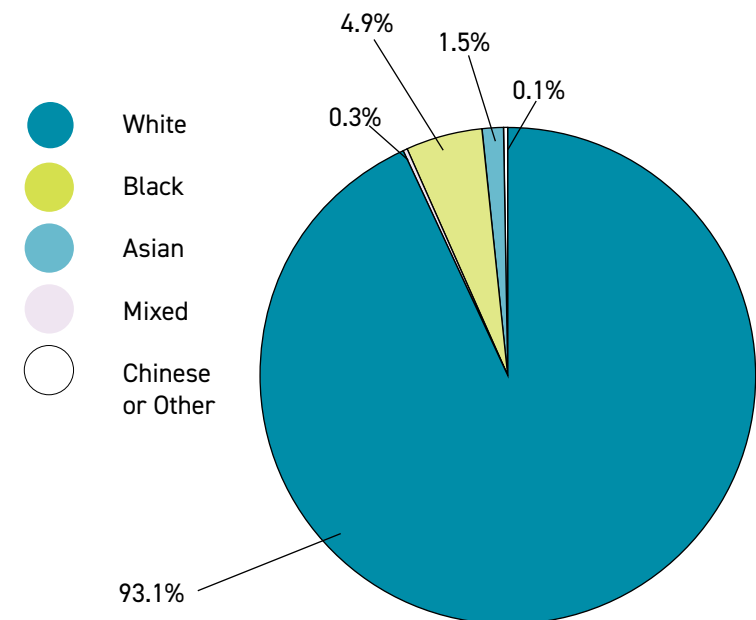

Attendance Allowance November 2019

Attendance Allowance, introduced in December 1971, is a benefit for people aged 65 and over who need help with personal care because of illness or disability. For example, a person may qualify for Attendance Allowance if they have difficulty with washing, dressing or similar tasks. The benefit is not income related, is not taxable and is not based on National Insurance Contributions. In general, the benefit has two payment levels. Those requiring help both during the day and night are eligible for a higher rate of £89.95 per week, otherwise recipients are provided with the lower level of benefit (£59.70 per week). In Kirklees there were 8,879 people claiming the allowance (11.4% of all aged 65 and over, England 12.9%).

Pension Credit November 2019

Pension Credit is an entitlement which guarantees everyone aged 60 and over a minimum income. Pension Credit has two parts: the guarantee credit and the savings credit (only paid to people aged 65 and over). The savings credit provides extra money to people who have income from occupational pensions or savings, giving the recipient a higher income than the guarantee credit. In Kirklees there were 12,418 claimants of Pension Credit of which 2,035 were in couples which accounts for 12.9% of all aged 65 and over (England 15.1%).

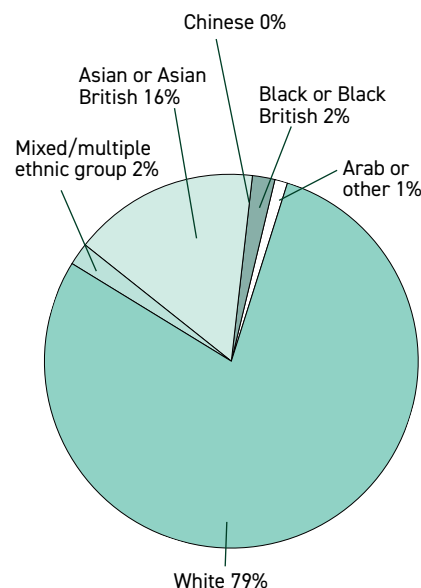

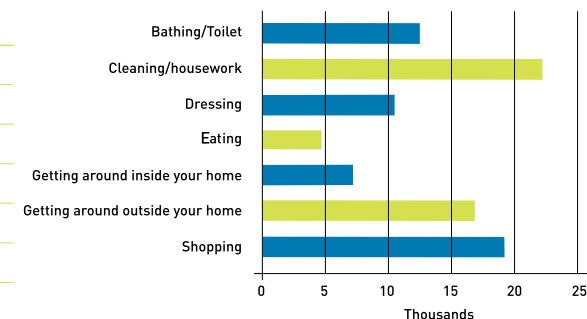

Personal Independence Payment June 2020

Personal Independence Payment (PIP) helps with some of the extra costs caused by long-term ill-health or a disability for people aged 16 to 64. People aged 65 and over can continue to claim PIP if the condition has not changed. PIP started to replace Disability Living Allowance (DLA) for people aged 16 to 64 from 8 April 2013. In Kirklees, 5.3% of all people (around 1 in 20) claim PIP; this increases to 11.2% for ages 60 to 69 (1 in 7). As at February 2020 there were still 8,317 people claiming DLA, though only 11.6% were of working age, with 34.4% aged 0 to 15 and 54% aged 65 and over.

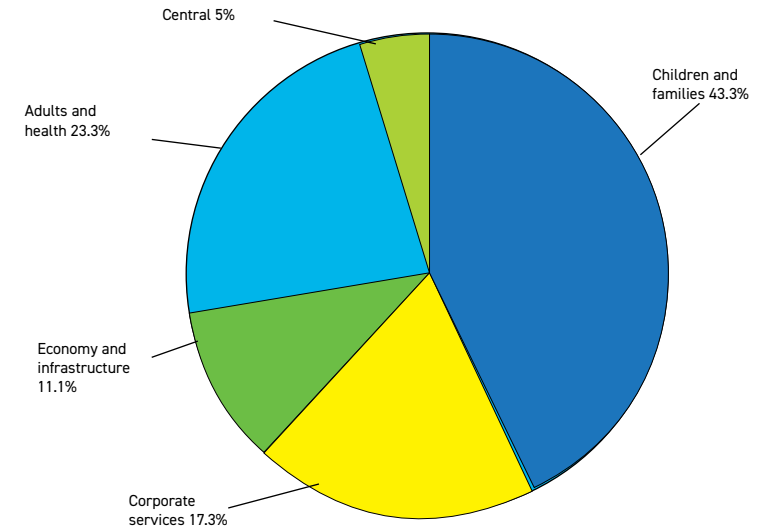

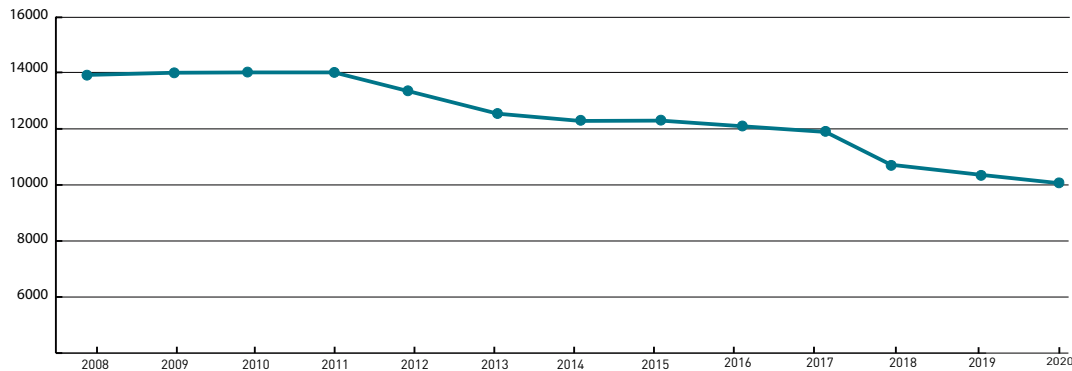
