Summary of key findings by ethnicity

- Perceptions of local area different issues for different ethnic groups: Overall
 Asian residents are the least likely to be satisfied with their local area as a place to
 live, Black residents were much less likely to feel people treat each other with respect
 and consideration and White residents were the least likely to agree that their local
 area is a place where people from different backgrounds get on well together.
- Black residents think more highly of their local town centre and are less likely to
 feel their local area has got worse: Black residents are most likely to be satisfied
 with their local town centre. Asian residents are twice as likely as Black residents to
 feel that their local area has got worse over the last three years.
- Black residents have better perceptions of our overall performance: They are much more likely than White and Asian residents to agree that they are satisfied with the way the council runs things and that the council provides value for money.
- Community safety is a much bigger concern for Asian residents: they are <u>less</u> <u>likely</u> to feel **safe outside** in their local area **in the day** and are also much more likely to feel that a number of issues are a big problem in their local area including people using or dealing drugs, and being drunk or rowdy in public places.
- Asian residents are more likely to be dissatisfied with some Streetscene issues:
 For example they are more likely to feel that rats and other pests are a problem in their local area and to be less satisfied with household waste collection and street cleaning.
- White residents are much more likely to feel their home meets their household's current needs.
- Black residents report higher levels of satisfaction with core services: for example children's centres and social care services.
- Black and Asian residents are more likely to want to be involved in their local communities: they report much higher levels of interest in getting involved in delivering services and making improvements in the future and are also more likely to agree that when they do get involved they can really change the way their area is run.
- Asian and Black residents are more likely than White residents to use person
 focused and verbal methods of finding out about the council such as their local
 councillor, telephone and word of mouth. And when asked about their preferred
 method of finding out about the council, Black respondents in particular were more
 likely to choose face-to-face methods.
- Asian and Black residents generally report higher levels of civic participation although self-reported voting rates are low amongst the Black community.
- Asian and Black respondents gave the lowest mean life satisfaction ratings, while Asian respondents gave the highest mean anxiety rating.
- Levels of interest in developing new skills and business start up are higher amongst Asian and Black residents.

Please note: for analysis purposes, data has been weighted by geographical area, age and gender and ethnicity. All analysis is based on weighted data from the core sample unless otherwise stated. 'Don't know' responses have been excluded from the sample base.

Summary of Your Place, Your Say findings by ethnicity

The following tables summarise some key Your Place, Your Say findings for respondents from different ethnic groups. The base number of returns for 'Mixed / multiple ethnic groups' and 'Other ethnic groups' was too small to include in this comparative analysis – but we have included the second tier splits White; Asian or Asian British; Black, African, Caribbean or Black British instead of using top level White / BME groups for this analysis.

The tables highlight where the results for different ethnic groups vary significantly <u>from the Kirklees average</u>. Boxes without shading are for variables where it is not appropriate to make a judgement about whether differences between responses are 'better' or 'worse'.

Priorities for Local Area and Prioritisation of Services

The 'priorities and value for money' document on the budget area of the council's website summarises how respondents from different ethnic groups rate various things as being important in making somewhere a good place to live, what needs improving in their local area and which services are most important to them personally. Please note – this analysis compared all BME respondents with White respondents.

In summary:

- Good public transport links and access to parks and open spaces were more important to White residents than those from a BME background. BME residents place higher importance on affordable decent housing, high performing schools and access to childcare facilities.
- More BME than White residents feel that the safety of the local environment, schools, access to community facilities and access to sport and active recreation opportunities are in need of improving in the local area.

APPENDIX A – Your Place, Your Say methodology and response rate by ethnicity

About the Your Place, Your Say survey: this was a household postal survey carried out in Kirklees between October-December 2011. A random sample of 35,000 households were sent a postal survey, and additional activity such as an online version of the survey, booster sampling and engagement with voluntary and community organisations were undertaken to boost responses from groups traditionally less likely to respond to postal surveys.

The survey sample: 8,244 responses were received to the random postal survey. This document summarises data from the random element of the sample only. Data from the non-random approaches will be used for more detailed exploration of community of interest responses, following this initial analysis of random survey data. Data based on 8,244 responses is subject to +/- 1 percentage point margin of error. Responses to the survey have been weighted by geographical area, age and gender and ethnicity to ensure that survey responses are representative of the Kirklees district.
