Dear Sir or Madam,

I am emailing in regard to the planning application 2021/93502 the demolition of a Badger Hey Farm near Slaithwaite.

The application notes that the adjoining cottage is listed Grade II and dates to the mid 18th century. However, on closer inspection of the listing it actually refers to "Badger Hey *and* Badger Hey Cottage":

Badger Hey Cottage: South elevation: Ground floor; Entrance with quoins and deep lintel (part blocked). One 4-light stone mullioned window (chamfered and recessed). First floor; One 3-light stone mullioned window (chamfered and recessed). One 2-light stone mullioned window (chamfered and recessed). East gable: Lean-to extension (modern). North elevation: Various modern casements (some in original openings). **Badger Hey:** South elevation: Ground floor; Entrance with quoins and initial and date on deep lintel: E S 17 59 One 4-light stone mullioned window (recessed). One 3-light stone mullioned window (recessed). First floor; Three 2-light stone mullioned windows (some rebuilding). Former barn to west; largely rebuilt: modern garage openings. Two 2-light windows. North elevation: Various modern casements (some in original openings).

I believe this listing may actually cover both the cottage and farmhouse, making them both Grade II listed. I believe the Farm is the Badger Hey referred to in the listing. I think it might be a mistake that the Historic England listing mapping has only tagged the one building - the cottage. This means the planning application does not reflect the potentially listed status of the farmhouse (it is not a listed building consent application) and the building could be lost without the appropriate planning and assessment process.
