<p>This is an objection against the proposed 50 houses on Shelpy road. This proposal is frankly criminal. Not only would these 50 houses increase the village by a third it would create chaos on already busy and overcrowded roads. These roads are not suitable for more people to use. Shelpy road is narrow with no pavement and has frequent accidents and reckless drivers. I use this road for biking and it isn't a safe route to use, however, all routes out of Stocksmoor are similar, with narrow country lanes that are dangerous for walkers, cyclists and runners. Adding up to another 150 people to a small village will greatly increase road accidents and traffic jams. Shelpy road is frequently jammed with road ragers who either cannot reverse or are too stubborn too. This means people going too and from work will be in constant traffic jams and road rage will increase. The traffic will also be increased by the fact that the village has no infrastructure and economy. There are no shops in the area the closest food shop would be kirkburton, Shelpy or New Mill and all of these areas require the roads that are dangerously overcrowded. New people who will need to use these routes will also increase the traffic. Furthermore, there will be an increase in adults and children on bikes who would have to pull out onto a blind corner which is a single carriageway road with no pavement. This is the same for walkers and runners. There has been no consideration or research put into this proposal as it's very clear to see how these house would be in a terrible area and will cause harm to the village.</p> <p>My second point is about the damage to the surrounding neighbourhood. The village has drainage issues and flooding problems plus frequent power outages. Putting new builds in this area when there is plenty of brown field land in Huddersfield is an outrageous thought to me. Furthermore, there reports on local wildlife is inaccurate. They stated that no endangered or protected animals live on that land when there are badgers, foxes, birds, bats and deer which use this land and have habitats there. These animals are protected for a reason and building on this land would disturb the wildlife. Newett homes need to focus on finding land which needs to be revived and reused instead of building on countryside in areas which need to be preserved.</p>
