

**Consultation Response from KC,
Highways Development Management****2024/92779 land at Providence Street, Earlsheaton, Dewsbury, WF12 8HZ****Outline application for residential development****Date Responded: 19-8-2025.****Responding Officer: Mark Berry.****Responding Ref: 15-6SE-13.**

This is an outline application for residential development at land at Providence Street, Earlsheaton, Dewsbury.

The highways consultation response dated 9th June concluded that the refuse vehicle swept paths drawing provided did not include any movements from the south-eastern side and that all movements needed to be considered.

The applicants have provided a further refuse vehicle swept paths drawings showing all vehicle movements and Highways Development Management have therefore no objection to these proposals.

Suggested conditions

Footway and Footway/cycleway to be Provided

Notwithstanding the details shown on the approved plan, the development shall not commence until a scheme detailing the provision of a 2.0m wide footway to the Providence Street Site Frontage as shown on drawing number 24023/GA 01 rev C and a 3.5 m shared footway/cycleway on to Town Street, construction specification, surfacing, drainage and kerbing including the relocation of an existing street lighting column and associated highway works has been submitted and approved in writing by the Local Planning Authority. The development shall not be brought into use until the approved scheme has been implemented and thereafter retained throughout the lifetime of the development.

Footnote.

The granting of planning permission does not authorise the carrying out of works within the highway, for which the written permission of the Council as Highway Authority is required. You are required to consult the Design Engineer (Kirklees Street Scene: 01484 221000) regarding obtaining this permission and approval of the construction specification. Please also note that the construction of vehicle crossings within the highway is deemed to be major works for the purposes of the New Roads and Street Works Act 1991 (Section 84 and 85). Interference with the highway without such permission is an offence which could lead to prosecution.
