### Current acquisitive crime/ ASB figures in the area

I have conducted crime and ASB incident searches utilising WYP data and mapping tool.

ASB search for incidents reported between 22/05/2024 and 22/05/2025 has not highlighted any current or recent issues of note.

Serious acquisitive crime search for offences committed in Lindley area between 22/05/2024 and 22/05/2025 yielded 62 results: 24x residential burglary, 4x robbery, 8x vehicle interference, 18x theft from motor vehicle, 8x theft of motor vehicle.

Amongst the residential burglaries 18 referred to homes and 6 to unconnected buildings such as sheds or garages. The most common method of entry was by causing damage to glazing, followed by attacking the door lock.

### Proposal

As per the Covering letter [id 1079362], the applicant proposes to omit a footpath between Dryden Way and Wadsworth Fold; the area is to be reseeded with a wildflower mix instead.

The applicant advised that should the proposal be objected, the footpath would be surfaced with tarmac, with timber steps and no lighting.

Having spoken to the applicant on 23/05/2025, should the variation be granted, there will be no public access to the piece of land in question. It will not be feasible to use it as a shortcut to Dryden Way. The timber fencing shall remain. A solid, lockable gate will be installed so the Management Company can access and maintain the area when necessary.

### Comments

As per Secured by Design guidance, footpaths should be safe, secure and accessible. They should not provide access to rear or side boundaries of dwellings as this has been proven to generate crime. Furthermore, footpaths should be well-lit and wide.

In my assessment, a footpath connecting Wadsworth Fold and Dryden Way would not meet any of the above criteria.

Additionally, in line with Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design, opportunities for access, egress and through movement should be minimised to prevent unauthorised access. Furthermore, the natural surveillance of the proposed footpath appears limited.

The footpath would increase the site's permeability and vulnerability of the properties in the immediate vicinity, increasing opportunities for acquisitive crime and antisocial behaviour.

I also have concerns about the safety of the proposed footpath- the land is indeed on a steep slope, the footpath itself would be narrow and unlit.

There are no apparent benefits of constructing the footpath from a crime reduction/ designing out crime perspective. The estate has other existing routes which can be utilised by residents.

**West Yorkshire Police support the application to omit the footpath and retain the land as landscaped.**
