Officer Report – 2025/93487

Site Description

The application site refers to 2, Belton Grove, Birchenclyffe, Huddersfield, HD3 3RF, a two-storey semi-detached property faced in brick and render, grey roof tiles, and uPVC windows and doors. The application property lies in a relatively uniform street scene, surrounded by properties of a similar size, scale, character, appearance, and age. Furthermore, the property benefits from an area of amenity space to the front and rear, as well as a garage and hard-standing parking area to the East.

Description of Proposal

The Scheme

The applicant is seeking permission for Erection of two storey and single storey side extensions with rear dormer and associated alterations.

Supporting Information

In addition to the submitted plans the following documents have been submitted to support the application:

- Climate Change Statement
- Design and Access Statement

History of Negotiations / Amendments Received

The following amended plans were submitted during the application process:

15/05/2026 – Proposed Layout and Elevations – 2542-02D

The amendments included reducing the width of the dormer to that of the original property, reducing overall height of dormer; squaring off the single storey side extension to increase visual appeal, an extended roof slope to the front elevation of the two storey side extension, removal of the window to the front elevation of the two storey side extension, windows changed to match those in the existing building.

Relevant Planning History

There is no relevant planning history at the application site.

Representations

Publication of the application has been undertaken in accordance with the Council's Development Management Charter (December 2024).

The application has been publicised on the Council's website and by site notice. The expiry date of the publicity period was the 12/02/2026.

Letters of Objection

- Concerns that the rear dormer extending directly to the shared boundary line would have an unreasonable impact upon the adjoined property and its development potential.

Officer Comment: This is addressed within the 'Residential Amenity' section of this report.

Consultation Responses

No consultations were considered necessary for this application.

Allocation and Policy

The site is unallocated within the Kirklees Local Plan (adopted 2019). The site is also located within a bat alert layer on the Council's GIS mapping system.

National planning policy and guidance is set out in National Policy Statements, primarily the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) published December 2024, the Planning Practice Guidance Suite (PPGS) first launched 6th March 2014 together with Circulars, Ministerial Statements and associated technical guidance.

A consultation draft of the National Planning Policy Framework (the Framework) was published on 16 December 2025. As a consultation, the document is at an early stage and subject to change. Accordingly, for the purposes of this application, no weight is given to the current consultation document.

The NPPF constitutes guidance for local planning authorities and is a material consideration in determining applications.

Section 38(6) of the Planning and Compulsory Purchase Act 2004 sets out that in considering planning applications the determination must be made in accordance with the plan unless material considerations indicate otherwise

Assessment

The following matters are considered in the assessment below –

1. Principle of development
1. Impact upon the character and appearance of the area (including impact upon historic environment)
2. Impact upon residential amenity
3. Impact upon highway safety
4. Climate Change
5. Other matters – e.g. trees/ecology (e.g. bats)
6. Representations
7. Conclusion

1 – Principle of Development

Policy LP1 of the KLP states that when considering development proposals, the Council will take a positive approach that reflects the presumption in favour of sustainable development contained in the NPPF.

Paragraph 11 concludes that the presumption in favour of sustainable development does not apply where specific policies in the NPPF indicate development should be restricted. This too will be explored.

Policy LP2 of the KLP sets out that all development proposals should seek to build on the strengths, opportunities and help address challenges identified in the Local Plan.

The dimensions of sustainable development will be considered throughout the proposal.

In terms of extending and making alterations to a property, Policy LP24 of the KLP is relevant, in conjunction with the House Extensions and Alterations SPD and Chapter 12 of the NPPF, regarding design. In this case, the principle of development is considered acceptable, and the proposal shall now be assessed against all other material planning considerations, including visual and residential amenity, as well as highway safety.

These issues along with other policy considerations will be addressed below.

Considering the above policy, the principle of the development is considered to be acceptable.

2 – Impact on character and appearance of the area

Visual Amenity

Section 12 of the NPPF discusses good design. Good design is a key aspect of sustainable development, it creates better places in which to live and work and helps to make development acceptable to communities. Local Plan Policies LP1, LP2 and most importantly LP24, are all also relevant. All the policies seek to achieve good quality design that retains a sense of local identity, which is in keeping with the scale of development in the local area and is visually attractive.

Local Plan Policy LP24(a) states that all proposals should promote good design by ensuring the following: *‘the form, scale, layout and details of all development respects and enhances the character of the townscape, heritage assets and landscape’*.

Key Design Principles 1 and 2 of the Council’s adopted House Extensions & Alterations Supplementary Planning Document (SPD) seek to ensure development is subservient to the host property and in keeping with the character of the locality.

The recommendations of Paragraphs 5.16, 5.17, 5.20, 5.22, 5.25, and 5.27 of the Council’s House Extensions and Alterations SPD are considered relevant.

The proposed single storey side extension does not extend further than two thirds of the width of the original house and is constructed using matching materials.

The two-storey side extension is compliant with the relevant policies for two-storey side extensions as set out in the House Extensions and Alterations SPD, and as a result of the extension in roof slope and removal of front window is considered to be visually sympathetic to the host property and street scene.

Finally, the proposed rear dormer has been reduced in scale to no longer dominate the rear roof plane and is set below the ridgeline of the existing roof, appearing proportionate to the existing dwelling.

The proposed development is therefore considered not to comply with Policies LP1, LP2 and LP24 of the Kirklees Local Plan, Principles 1 and 2 and Paragraphs 5.16, 5.17, 5.20, 5.22, 5.25, and 5.27 of the Council's House Extensions and Alterations SPD and Policies within Chapter 12 of the National Planning Policy Framework.

3. Impact on Residential Amenity

Sections B and C of LP24 states that alterations to existing buildings should:

"...maintain appropriate distances between buildings' and '...minimise impact on residential amenity of future and neighbouring occupiers."

Further to this, Paragraph 135 of the National Planning Policy Framework states that planning decisions should ensure that developments have a high standard of amenity for existing and future users.

Key Design Principles 3, 4, 5 and 6 of the Council's adopted House Extensions & Alterations SPD seek to ensure development does not have a detrimental impact upon privacy of neighbouring occupiers, cause unacceptable levels of overshadowing or be unacceptably oppressive / overbearing.

The recommendations of Paragraphs 5.16, 5.20, 5.22, 5.25, and 5.27 of the Council's House Extensions and Alterations SPD are considered relevant.

The proposed single storey side extension is located an adequate distance away from neighbouring properties and is of limited enough height to have no significant impact upon neighbouring properties regarding overshadowing, overbearing, light, or outlook.

The proposed two-storey side extension is located at least 1m from all surrounding property boundaries and therefore is considered to be located for enough away from all neighbouring properties to have no significant impact

upon adjacent dwellings regarding overshadowing, overbearing, light, or outlook.

All openings in the side extensions are considered to have no extra impact than window openings already existing in the dwelling, therefore, there are to be no extra impact upon privacy and overlooking.

Finally, the proposed rear dormer extension is also considered to have no significant impact upon residential amenity as there is not considered to be any significant impact upon neighbouring buildings to the North as they are not primarily residential.

It is noted that an objection has been submitted regarding the scale and location of the dormer impacting the development ability of the adjoined dwelling. It is considered that there would be enough space for the proposed rear dormers at both properties to be constructed as proposed, however, for the dormer proposed in the current application to be designed to an acceptable standard, the dormer has been slightly set in from the adjoined boundary and down from the ridge. As a result, the development capability of the neighbouring dwelling would improve in the case of a more acceptably designed proposal being submitted.

It is therefore considered that in terms of residential amenity, the proposed would comply with Policy LP24 of the Kirklees Local Plan, Key Principles 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7 of the House Extensions and Alterations SPD, and Policies within Paragraph 135 of the National Planning Policy Framework.

4. Impact on Highway Safety

Policies LP21 and LP22 of the Kirklees Local Plan and Chapter 9 of the NPPF relate to access and highway safety and are considered to be relevant to the consideration of this application. The Council's adopted Highway Design Guide and Key Design Principle 15 of the adopted House Extensions & Alterations SPD which seek to ensure acceptable levels of off-street parking are retained are also considered to be of relevance.

Principle 19 of the Council's adopted House Extensions & Alterations Supplementary Planning Document (SPD) requires the provision for waste storage and recycling must be incorporated into the design of new developments in such a way that it is convenient for both collection and use whilst having minimal visual impact on the development.

It should be noted that although nothing specific is detailed on the submitted plans, the site will retain adequate space for waste storage.

The number of bedrooms in the property will increase by one as a result of the proposal, increasing the total number of bedrooms from three to four, thus increasing the required number of off-street parking spaces from two to three. As the existing garage on site is not large enough to accommodate a parking space, it is considered that the existing driveway will continue to act as the

only parking provision on site. As the existing parking provision on site will not be reduced, and there is opportunity for on-street parking outside the dwelling, it is considered that the property can accommodate the new necessary parking standards.

Furthermore, the proposal will have no significant impact on highway safety as the dwelling is set well back from the closest highway.

It is therefore considered that in terms of access and highway safety / parking the proposed would comply with Policies LP21 and LP22 of the Kirklees Local Plan, Principle 15 of the Council's Street Design Guide and Chapter 9 of the National Planning Policy Framework.

5. Climate Change

On 12th November 2019, the Council adopted a target for achieving 'net zero' carbon emissions by 2038, with an accompanying carbon budget set by the Tyndall Centre for Climate Change Research. National Planning Policy includes a requirement to promote carbon reduction and enhance resilience to climate change through the planning system and these principles have been incorporated into the formulation of Local Plan policies. The Local Plan predates the declaration of a climate emergency and the net zero carbon target. However, it includes a series of policies, which are used to assess the suitability of planning applications in the context of climate change. When determining planning applications, the Council will use the relevant Local Plan policies and guidance documents to embed the climate change agenda.

Considering the scale and nature of the proposed development, especially that it is for private use, it is considered that the proposed development would not have an impact on climate change that needs mitigation to address the climate change emergency. The proposed development would therefore comply with Chapter 14 of the National Planning Policy Framework.

6. Other Matters

Impact upon Ecology

Chapter 15 of the National Planning Policy Framework is relevant, together with The Conservation of Habitats and Species Regulations 2017 which protect, by law, the habitat and animals of certain species including newts, bats and badgers.

Policy LP30 of the Kirklees Local Plan requires that proposals protect Habitats and Species of Principal Importance. Whilst it is acknowledged that the site is located within an identified bat roosting area, the proposals are relatively modest, and in this case would not impact upon the existing roof space which has the potential for providing a roost for bats. Therefore it is considered unlikely that the proposals would have a significant impact on the bat population. An informative would be included making the applicant aware that if bats are discovered on site during the works, any development shall cease,

and the applicant is advised to contact Natural England for advice on how to move forward. Subject to informative the proposal is considered to be acceptable in this regard.

7. Representations

All representations have been addressed earlier in this report.

8. Conclusion

The NPPF has introduced a presumption in favour of sustainable development. The policies set out in the NPPF taken as a whole constitute the Government's view of what sustainable development means in practice.

This application has been assessed against relevant policies in the development plan and other material considerations. It is considered, the proposed development would constitute sustainable development and is therefore recommended for approval.

1. The development hereby permitted shall be begun within three years of the date of this permission.
Reason: Pursuant to the requirements of Section 91 of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990 (as amended).
1. The development hereby permitted shall be carried out in complete accordance with the plans and specifications schedule listed in this decision notice, except as may be specified in the conditions attached to this permission, which shall in all cases take precedence.
Reason: For the avoidance of doubt as to what is being permitted and to accord with Policies LP01, LP02, LP21, LP22 & LP24 of the Kirklees Local Plan, Principles 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11 & 15 of the Council's adopted House Extensions & Alterations Supplementary Planning Document and Policies within Chapters 2, 9, 12 and 14 of the National Planning Policy Framework
2. The external walls and roofing materials of the extension hereby approved shall in all respects match those used in the construction of the existing building.

Reason: In the interests of visual amenity and in accordance with Policies LP01, LP02 & LP24 of the Kirklees Local Plan, Principles 1 and 2 the Council's adopted House Extensions and Alterations Supplementary Planning Document and policies within Chapter 12 of the National Planning Policy Framework.

NOTE: Due to its location, a bat roost may be present on site. Bats are a European protected species under regulation 42 of The Conservation of Habitats and Species Regulations 2017. It is an offence for anyone intentionally to kill, injure or handle a bat, disturb a roosting bat, or sell or offer a bat for sale without a licence. It is also an offence to damage, destroy or obstruct access to any place used by bats for shelter, whether they are present or not. If bats are discovered on site development shall cease and the applicant is advised to contact Natural England for advice.
