



I am writing to formally and wholeheartedly object to the proposed construction of two dwellings on the green land at Eastborough Crescent.

This space is not just an empty plot on a map. It is part of the living character of our community. It provides a sense of openness, breathing space, and calm in what is otherwise an increasingly built-up area. Once it is gone, it is gone forever.

Eastborough Crescent has always benefited from this stretch of green land. It softens the street scene, supports local wildlife, and offers visual relief from brick and concrete. Many of us chose to live here because of that balance between housing and greenery. Removing this space would permanently alter the character of the area and erode the very qualities that make it special.

For many families, this land is more than scenery — it is where our children play during the summer months. It is where they run freely, kick a ball around, meet their friends, and enjoy being outdoors in a safe and familiar environment. In a time when children already spend too much time indoors, spaces like this are invaluable. Taking this away would remove a simple but meaningful part of their childhood.

There are also very real practical concerns. Additional dwellings will inevitably increase traffic, parking pressure, noise, and strain on local infrastructure. Parking on Eastborough Crescent is already limited, and residents frequently struggle to find suitable spaces near their homes. Constructing two new dwellings will further reduce available parking and create unnecessary tension and difficulty for neighbours. What may appear minor in planning terms will have a daily impact on those of us who live here.

Beyond infrastructure, there is a wider environmental responsibility. In a time when green spaces are being lost at an alarming rate, protecting the small areas we still have is vital. These spaces contribute to biodiversity, help manage surface water, and improve air quality. They are part of our shared commitment to sustainability and wellbeing.

Most importantly, this land holds emotional value. It is part of the identity of Eastborough Crescent. It provides a sense of space and light that benefits everyone — families, older residents, and future generations. Development here would not just change the landscape; it would diminish the community spirit and the environment we treasure.

I respectfully urge the Council to refuse this application and protect this green space for the long-term benefit of residents and the wider area.
