

**Statement of Community Consultation:
Proposed Woodley School and College at
Fernside Avenue in Almondbury, Huddersfield**

July 2024

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1. Introduction

- 1.1 This document has been prepared following the public consultation on the proposed new building for Woodley School and College.
- 1.2 At Kirklees Council we want our children and young people with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) to live and be educated in Kirklees.
- 1.3 To enable more children and young people to secure places and thrive in local educational settings, the replacement and rebuild of two special schools was approved and is part of the wider SEND Transformation Programme.

2. Public Consultation

- 2.1 Between 7 May 2024 and 17 June 2024, public consultation took place on the proposed newly built special school on Fernside Avenue in Almondbury, Huddersfield.
- 2.2 The details regarding the consultation were shared by both a public consultation poster and leaflet ([Appendix 1](#)).
- 2.3 The consultation involved sharing draft site plans ([Appendix 6](#)), including proposed landscape spatial arrangement, proposed floor plans along with an artistic illustration.
- 2.4 The public's views were gathered via a survey, asking four questions ([Appendix 3](#)). The survey was available both online and a paper copy.
- 2.5 The online survey was set up and managed by the Kirklees Council Consultation Team. A freepost address was available for paper surveys, and these were received to the Kirklees Council Mailing Services.
- 2.6 Two key stakeholder groups were identified, in addition to the wider Kirklees population, for the consultation:
 - a. The Almondbury area;
 - b. Parents / carers of children and young people with SEND and partners / professionals supporting children and young people with SEND.

The Almondbury area

- 2.7 1025 addresses neighbouring or close to the site were identified ([Appendix 2](#)). A letter, information poster and paper copy of the survey (with freepost return address) was sent via mail directly to these addresses.
- 2.8 The nearby schools (Hill View Academy and Southgate School) were included within the direct mail out.
- 2.9 Almondbury Ward Members were emailed providing electronic copies of consultation material, with printed copies available on request.

Parents / carers of children and young people with SEND and partners / professionals supporting children and young people with SEND

- 2.10 The information leaflet was shared with Woodley School and College and cascaded to parents and carers of existing pupils and shared with their staff and governor teams.
- 2.11 Information was accessible on the Kirklees Local Offer website which is accessible to all.

Kirklees wide

- 2.12 Two drop-in sessions were held:
- a. 14 May, 4.30pm-6.30pm at Woodley School and College – representatives from Kirklees Council, Frank Shaw Associates, Woodley School and College were in attendance with support from PCAN¹ – 5 conversations took place with 1 paper survey completed.
 - b. 21 May, 3.30pm-5.30pm at Hill View Academy – representatives from Kirklees Council, Frank Shaw Associates, Woodley School and College were in attendance with support from PCAN – 9 conversations took place and support provided to 3 people to complete the electronic survey.
- 2.13 A webpage for the development was available ([Appendix 5](#)), a QR code and weblink to this page was included on the information leaflet and poster. The page had 459 unique views (647 views in total). The page included a link to the online survey.
- 2.14 An article was published on the Kirklees Together platform on 8 May including the link through to the webpage above. The article had 1694 views.
- 2.15 An article was published on Kirklees Business Solutions, accessible to all Kirklees schools, on 13 May. The article had 338 views.
- 2.16 An article was included in the May edition of the SEND Transformation Newsletter, which was published on 21 May. The distribution of the newsletter includes Portfolio Holders, MPs, Cabinet Members, Councillors, various Boards, partners across Health, Education, Social Care, internal council services and via the Local Offer platforms.
- 2.17 The SEND Transformation Newsletter was shared on Kirklees Business Solution on 23 May.

3. Consultation Findings

- 3.1 50 survey responses were received ([Appendix 4](#)), of which 46 were submitted online, 1 paper survey was completed during drop-in sessions, and 3 paper surveys were returned via the freepost address.

3.2 Question 1 of the survey asked “Please tell us anything you like about the proposed development”. Out of a possible 50 responses; 35 were positive, 1 negative, 6 comment/neutral, 8 were blank.

3.3 Broad themes of positive comments were:

Theme	Comments – direct quotes from the consultation
a. Overall design of the site	<p>“It will be beautiful school with green areas around it.”</p> <p>“The site looks incredible, comprehensive and well thought out. I think parents will appreciate the car park especially for those with disabilities that require longer time to get into the school. The forest school provision is also extremely positive!”</p> <p>“Amazing design, very clever.”</p> <p>“The plans look great and think this would be a great replacement for the old Almondbury school and associated grounds.”</p> <p>“The bus drop off system looks well thought out and systematic and should greatly improve the smooth running of the before and after school routines for the children.”</p> <p>“It look very well planned and fit for purpose. Great use of space and love the outdoor areas. Good parking areas and drop off points.”</p>
b. Increasing special school places	<p>“Great for SEND kids to have extra provision in a purpose built school”</p> <p>“Excellent idea to increase Send provision in the area”</p> <p>“I think it’s a good idea if it’s helping people also if it’s helping Kirklees Council not having to pay so much money out to transport children all over Yorkshire”</p> <p>“This will provide specialist facilities that are required in the Huddersfield area.”</p> <p>“The school is good news as we need more SEND places. The site needs to be used and it's better than building houses on it.”</p>

3.4 Question 2 of the survey asked “Please tell us anything you dislike about the proposed development”. Out of a possible 50 responses; 16 were positive, 12 negative, 12 comment/neutral, 10 were blank.

3.5 Concerns regarding the proposed development related to:

Theme	Response
<p>a. Traffic and parking</p>	<p>The site is accessed off Fernside Avenue, via an upgraded access point realigning the existing access. to allow for two-way traffic flows.</p> <p>On entering the site a Visitor Car Park (including 23 standard bays, 3 accessible bays, 4 EV bays) is located by the site entrance.</p> <p>A small internal access road leads to a Staff Car Park which has 118 parking bays including spaces for 4 minibuses, 3 accessible bays and 6 standard bays.</p> <p>The site has been designed to accommodate a flexible student drop off / external play area, located to the east of the main school building which is accessed via the staff car park. This provides an informal drop-off loop for 18 mini-buses and 12 cars, designed to be utilised as soft and hard external play when not in use as a drop-off space. This is secured via fence and gates from the staff car park and gives direct access into the courtyard. This allows students to safely access the school building.</p> <p>The car parks have been designed so that vehicles waiting to pick up students are within the school site and do not back on to the local highways network and sufficient onsite parking is provided to accommodate staff and visitors to the school.</p> <p>Kirklees Council has employed a Transport Consultant to assess the traffic impacts and a Transport Statement produced.</p>
<p>b. Impact on local community spaces</p>	<p>Following approval for the rebuild and expansion of Woodley School and College on the former high school site at Fernside Avenue, Frank Shaw Associates were appointed to undertake the master planning of the site in order to determine the best position for the school and the extensive grounds required for a 180 place school for children and young people with Complex Communication & Interaction (CCI) needs (including Autism Spectrum Condition).</p> <p>The master planning exercise determined that a cleared site approach would provide the most cost effective and efficient design for the new build school. This requires the clearing of several existing</p>

Continued - Impact on local community spaces	<p>buildings on the site, making way for construction of the new, specially designed Woodley School and College. The buildings affected by the clearing of the site, are the former high school buildings, an unsustainable swimming pool close to life expiry, an unsustainable closed sports centre in the middle of the site not suitable for a special school and a building used by a private pre-school on a lease basis.</p> <p>Working in partnership with the private pre-school, work is now underway to relocate the provision into Almondbury Library and Children’s Centre. Minor alterations have been completed to make more effective use of an underused crèche facility in the centre, with an appropriate lease arrangement being agreed by both parties. This helps ensure this important service remains in the heart of the community to serve local families.</p> <p>The development has been designed to enable separate access by the local community to sports facilities and ancillary facilities including the main hall and MUGA. As such, the proposed development will enhance opportunities available to the local community to utilise the development as a community sports facility.</p> <p>In addition, the proposed development will have no impact on the existing sports pitches as site levels and banking have been designed to not impact the existing pitch lining. The proposed banking will provide an opportunity for spectators to sit and watch games played on the sports pitches and will also create an attractive landscaped setting for the development. Therefore, the development protects these existing sporting facilities.</p>
c. Costs	<p>The Council is currently involved in the High Needs Block Safety Valve Programme and has been successful in securing £33.5m of revenue funding and £8.2m of capital funding. As part of the Safety Valve plan to reduce the historic deficit position, work is ongoing to increase local capacity through the development of Additionally Resourced Provisions (ARPs), Special School Satellite Provisions and the rebuilding of two of our existing special schools. The rebuild and expansion of Woodley School and College and Joseph Norton Academy are vital</p>

Continued - Costs	<p>elements increasing local capacity for children and young people with complex Special Educational Needs. The agreement states the Council's commitment to; 'Implement joint commissioning and sufficiency strategies, re-balancing the range of placements, services, and provision locally. These will include rebuilding and creating additional SEMH and Complex ASD special school places and increasing additionally resourced provision, to ensure a sufficient mix of flexible services and local placements for children and young people. Kirklees will have sufficient local education places that meet the needs of their population. This includes re-building 2 schools that will create an additional 100+ places.</p> <p>The current spend from the High Needs Block (ring fenced government funding) for Independent School Places is around £11.1m per year, for 198 pupils. By developing local high-quality capacity, there is an explicit assumption that the number of children educated at Non-Maintained Independent Special Schools (NMISS) will reduce as we will be able to accommodate the needs of our children locally. The current average cost of these placements is £60K per annum and the current average cost of a place at Woodley is £28K per annum (a difference of £32K per year), and at Joseph Norton Academy £37K per annum (a difference of £23K per year). The DfE expect that saving assumptions have been factored into the Safety Valve for each school rebuild meaning that over time, and in line with trajectory management that securing sufficient places locally would contribute to our High Needs Block being financially sustainable. Increasing places earlier has the potential to improve upon the Safety Valve position.</p> <p>In addition to the Safety Valve capital funding, High Needs Provision Capital Allowance funding (which can only be used to support places for children with SEND) will also contribute to the cost of rebuilding the special schools.</p>

- 3.6 Of the total possible 200 comments available from the 50 individual responses received, the number of comments relating to the concern themes above were:
- a. Traffic and parking – 18 comments from 13 individual responses
 - b. Impact on local community spaces – 21 comments from 13 individual responses
 - c. Costs – 5 comments from 5 individual responses
- 3.7 During the consultation period, no emails was received to the available email address – SEND.TransformationProgramme@kirklees.gov.uk.

Kirklees Council and Woodley School and College are working in partnership to create a purpose built special school, with approximately 180 places for children and young people with complex autism.

Woodley School and College is currently situated on a site off Dog Kennel Bank in Huddersfield, operating from multiple buildings including two Grade 2 listed buildings. Additional teaching spaces have been added over time, however, any further developments are restricted due to the site.

The preferred site for the replacement new school is land that was formerly home to a high school on Fernside Avenue, Almondbury. An illustrative layout for the new school building and site is shown overleaf. Our intention is to apply for planning permission during the summer, but we are very keen to hear your views on the project first.

The development will create additional special school places for pupils aged 5-15 years, with a post-16 provision. The new school will provide a suitable environment for a high level of therapeutic support, alongside excellent teaching for children with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND).



It is hoped that work to start clearing the site will begin in the coming months followed by the construction phase.

We would like to invite you to a public consultation drop-in at which you are welcome to view the proposal, ask questions and give us your feedback. There is no need to book, just come at the time that suits you best.



Sufficient meaning for the needs of all staff, visitors, deliveries, pupil transport and parent/guardian needs. This should include a system to prevent any overspill onto the local roads (especially Fernside Avenue). There is clearly the opportunity to completely avoid the disgraceful situation that developed outside Southgate School on Southfield Road where there has been a clear underdevelopment of such capacity such that the local road is regularly abused mainly by school staff and visitors particularly at school opening and closure times. Woodley School and College



We've progressed plans for a new special school in Almondbury, which will create new, purpose-built facilities for children and young people with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND).

Why the new school is being built

One of our priorities is making sure young people have the best start in life.

As part of a large investment in local SEND schools, Woodley School and College is one of two special schools which are set to be relocated and improved, creating better provision locally and reducing the need for children and young people with special educational needs to travel outside of Kirklees for education.

The new development will provide a bespoke, high quality school for these students, greatly improving on the school's current facilities and allowing it to increase the number of places it offers.

Have your say on our plans

We are working in partnership with Woodley School and College to create a purpose-built special school with approximately 180 places for children and young people with complex autism.

Woodley School and College is currently situated on a site off Dog Kennel Bank in Huddersfield, operating from multiple buildings, including two Grade II listed buildings. Additional teaching spaces have been added over time, but any further developments are restricted due to the site.

The development will create additional special school places for pupils aged 5-15 years, with a post-16 provision. The new school will provide a suitable environment for a high level of therapeutic support, alongside excellent teaching for pupils with SEND.

What happens next

The plans require the clearing of several existing buildings on the site, making way for construction of the new, specially designed Woodley School and College.

The buildings affected by the clearing of the site, which is on Fernside in Almondbury, are the former school, the swimming pool and sports centre, and a building currently used by a private pre-school.

The sports centre is currently disused, and Almondbury Swimming Pool is not open to the public. Alternative locations were recently found for swimming lessons and club activities during a temporary closure.

We're also working closely with the private preschool to move it from its existing site on Fernside Avenue to the purpose built Early Years facility at Almondbury Children's Centre and Library, off Farfield Road, for the continuity of its services.

It is hoped that work to start clearing the site will begin in the coming months, followed by the construction phase.

Why Woodley School and College needs a new building

Currently, the council does not have enough special school places for children and young people with special educational needs and disabilities. This means some children have to go to school outside of Kirklees or to independent schools, which are very expensive for the council and not always the best option for the child or their family.

The new school building will increase the number of places available at Woodley School and College to 180.

The increase in places cannot be achieved at their current site. The current school buildings are dated, with any further developments being restricted due to the site.
