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Highlights so far

The Children's Panel received an update on PHSE and Prevent and was satisfied with work being carried out. The Panel considered the minutes of the Children's Services Improvement Board and suggested amendments to the approach to ensure that the voice of front line social workers is captured.

The Corporate Panel had a visit to the Customer Service Centre to look at the service offer. The panel was impressed by the seamless processes. A scanning system developed by the Council has been successfully sold to other Local Authorities. The Panel also had a demonstration of the new Citizen Account and provided feedback. Other areas of scrutiny have included financial performance monitoring and looking at the progress of the Transformation Programme.

Economies and Neighbourhoods had an informative overview of current housing issues. The Panel decided to focus on the availability and demand for supported housing; the review of the Housing Allocations Policy; Improving the availability of affordable homes for purchase or rental.

The Health and Adult Social Care Panel has looked at the robustness of the Adult Social Care and the Health Optimisation Programme. The issues raised by the Panel regarding Health Optimisation were discussed by the Lead Member with Clinical Commissioning Groups and Public Health. In respect of Adult Social Care the Panel put forward suggestions and recommendations to help improve the approach that is taken to engaging and consulting on proposed changes to services. In November the Panel considered proposed changes to Podiatry Services and looked at proposed interim changes to inpatient Elderly medicine, Cardiology and Respiratory Services.

A new Ad Hoc Scrutiny Panel

Joint Health Scrutiny... the latest position

Calderdale and Kirklees JHSC

The Committee is still waiting for the Secretary of State to seek advice from the IRP following the JHSC's referral in July. A follow up letter was sent on 24 November 2017 requesting that the referral was progressed as soon as possible.

West Yorkshire JHOSC

The Committee met on 28 November 2017 to receive an update on the development of the proposals to determine the optimal service delivery models for specialist stroke services across West Yorkshire and Harrogate. The Committee also received a progress update on the West Yorkshire and Harrogate (WY&H) Health and Care Partnership.

A forward work programme for the Committee is currently being scoped out and a development session will take place in January 2018 focussing on the key areas of work emerging from the WY&H Health and Care partnership.
